PRESERVING HISTORIC LEXINGTON

As the owner or occupant of a building in Lexington's Downtown Historic Preservation District, you benefit from the attractive appearance and enhanced property values that historic districting promotes. At the same time, being in the Historic District does entail some special obligations and responsibilities.

In particular, to ensure that all properties in the District are carefully preserved, the City of Lexington requires that you obtain approval for changes to your property. This approval, called a Certificate of Appropriateness, is issued by Lexington Architectural Board. Before beginning any work on your building, you should always check with the Planning & Development Department at City Hall (300 East Washington Street, 540-462-3704) to determine if a Certificate of Appropriateness is required.

ACTIONS REQUIRING A CERTIFICATE OF APPROPRIATENESS

Demolition of part or all of an existing building

Construction of a new building

Construction of any addition to an existing building

Moving a building

Remodeling or renovation of the exterior of a building

Removal of any architectural element

Painting of any building exterior

Cleaning or repair of wall surfaces or architectural elements

Posting or painting of signs

Any removal, alteration, repair, or construction of amenities such as fences or walls

STEPS TO OBTAIN A CERTIFICATE OF APPROPRIATENESS

- 1. Decide exactly what will be done. (Facade work? Painting? New construction? New signage? etc.)
 - 2. Work out a preliminary design.
- 3. Obtain application forms from the Planning & Development Department or from the City of Lexington's website, www.lexingtonva.gov.
- 4. Finalize the design and describe it completely on the application form.

 (Return the <u>completed</u> form to the Planning & Development Department at least <u>fifteen</u> (15) days before the meeting of the Board.)
- 5. Attend the Architectural Board review of the project (Thursday afternoons at City Hall), and revise the project design if necessary.
- 6. Receive confirmation by mail that your application has been approved.
