25 Ideas to Enhance Downtown Lexington

1. Achieve Minimum ADA Standards: Remove barriers to pedestrians and accessibility – minimum width for ADA- compliant sidewalk is 36 inches (3 feet).	2. Curb Extensions and Sidewalk Paving: Help to provide additional sidewalk space for pedestrian movement; maintain existing brick paving patterns, but develop new standards for new areas.
3. Sidewalk Trees and Seasonal Plantings: Provide trees in select locations, allow shade while not blocking views of historical architecture; enhance/increase seasonal plantings.	4. Underground Utilities on Jefferson Street: Reduces visual clutter and increases pedestrian mobility; small bulbouts as an interim solution.
5. Pedestrian Through Zone : Create a consistent corridor along sidewalks dedicated to the movement of people; ideally 48" wide, with a minimum of 36".	6. New Color Scheme - Black vs. Brown: New fixtures and furniture should be black, replacing the existing brown color scheme; will have the effect of a fresh coat of paint and creates a timeless and classic look.
7. Public Art: Opportunities exist to install public art in the Downtown, which can bring a modern flair and visual interest to complement, without altering, the historic setting.	8. SmartArt Tour/Sounds Around Virginia: Take advantage of smartphone technology and self-guide audio tours to promote the story of the area and the City.
9. Historical Markers: Consider historical paver project, installation of historical markers (Clark Trail), and information kiosks to create interest and share information.	10. Wall Mural Opportunity: Look for opportunities to create wall murals on large, blank walls to create interest and promote the City's attributes.
11. Public Greenspace Utilization: Explore ways to enhance the Downtown's existing public greenspaces (Hopkins Green, Old Courthouse Green, etc)	12. Wayfinding: Automobile & Pedestrian Scale: Implement the City's portion of the regional wayfinding system developed for Lexington/Rockbridge Tourism.
13. Sign Diet : Look to consolidate parking signage to reduce sign clutter in the Downtown.	14. Gateway Improvements at "The Split": The intersection of Main and Jefferson Streets is a natural gateway to the Downtown, explore ways to create interest and improve the pedestrian experience.

15. Two-Way Traffic on South Main Street: Investigate making S. Main Street, south from Nelson Street, two-way; improves access to these portions of Downtown and removes commercial traffic from residential areas.	16. Nelson Street Bridge & Gateway at Nelson and Main Street: The addition of banners, plantings, and new lighting on and around the new bridge works to create a sense of arrival and serves as the Downtown's primary gateway.
17. Visitor Center Relocation: Consider relocation the Visitor Center to a site within the historic core of Downtown Lexington; an appropriate site would need to have easy pedestrian and vehicle access, visibility, adequate parking and bus access.	18. New Streetscape Furnishings: To create a more welcoming environment, work to install trees, lighting, bollards, trash cans, benches, planters, tree grates, etc
19. Pedestrian Scale Lighting: Provide new pedestrian lighting with hanging flower baskets, to create interest and improve pedestrian safety.	20. Updated Traffic Signals: Provide new vehicular and pedestrian signals at all intersections, to improve appearance but also pedestrian and motorist safety.
21. Bike Accommodations: Provide bike racks and sharrows in the Downtown to encourage cycling and improve safety.	22. Outdoor People Places: Look for opportunities to provide <i>parklets</i> in the Downtown to create places for lingering and possibly outdoor dining.
23. Mid-Block Crossings: Provide 6 mid- block pedestrian crossings in the Downtown (3 on Main and 3 on Jefferson) to improve pedestrian mobility and safety.	24. Washington Street Pedestrian Improvements: As a primary pedestrian corridor, look to improve the pedestrian environment by widening sidewalks and removing barriers; alternating the removal of parking from one side of the street would necessary.
25. Placemaking Opportunities & The Pedestrian Alley System: The collection of many of the above ideas works to create an improved sense of place; additionally, look to improve the access to and visibility of existing alleys to serve as a secondary pedestrian system, improving access to parking and areas of the Downtown.
